**Book Review - INTO THE ABYSS** by Carol Shaben. 363.124

On 19 October 1984 a Piper Navajo commuter plane with 10 people on board, flying from Edmonton, Alberta, to High Prairie in Northern Alberta, crashed in forest some miles short of its destination. It was night-time, snowing and snow was thick on the ground. Six people were killed. The survivors were the pilot Erik Vogel; Larry Shaben, a member of the Provincial Parliament; Scott Deschamps, a Mountie; and Paul Archambault, the Mountie's prisoner. Paul was the least injured and Scott the worst.

Larry was mobile but lost his glasses and could not see enough to be useful, and Erik was too badly hurt to help. Paul managed to get out of the plane which was upside down, and having looked around, got out the other survivors and started a fire. He kept the fire going with help from Larry until they were rescued some fifteen hours later. These men kept a lasting friendship. A really remarkable story, and very readable. We have had some excellent and very informative speakers for the first three meetings of 2019.

- **Dr Mazin Bahho** from EIT came and addressed us on Sustainable Housing, explaining in some detail the project he is leading with a cohort of his Design Students building a house that is completely self-sustaining using recycled building materials.
- **Selwyn Hawthorne** came and spoke to us about the voluntary work he is doing for various fundraising trusts such as the Little Elms Village, an accommodation facility for parents with children in Hastings Hospital. He is also involved in fundraising for the Weka Point Scout camp in Rissington and indeed other worthwhile charities.
- **Kahori Nakagawa** came and spoke to us at our last meeting about the work she is doing through ECOED Trust for DOC and the preservation of Kiwi at Lake Opouahi in Tutira. The address was wide ranging with plenty of facts and figures regarding such things as Kiwi populations and indeed pest control.

Coming up we have **Clare Hague** from the NCC coming to speak to us at our May meeting covering a variety of local government issues. Specifically: her experiences and observations as a first term councillor about the connection between local government and its communities of interest - and how "democracy" is viewed differently depending on your particular community; polarization of issues eg locals vs. tourists; economic

development vs. the environment; infrastructure vs. vibrancy projects and how we can move beyond this to constructive debate and engagement.

The impact of the rise of social media communities on those involved in local government, and related and increasing concerns about its negative impacts on our young people. Continuing the youth community theme - the role of communities and local government in addressing the need to ensure the unemployed and unemployable can meaningfully participate in our community. Pulling all of these together to think about how we behave towards each other within and across our various communities of interest, and how this could be improved to ensure that constructive and well-reasoned debate leads to decisions that reflect the "greater good" in our region.

There is **no meeting in June**, but in July we have **Sean Bevin** a well-known HB Economist coming to speak to us about the HB Economy. And then in August we have **Ally Beale** coming to tell us all about the old Napier prison.

### **NAPIER SECONDARY SCHOOLS' SPEECH COMPETITION . . . . . Franki James**

For a number of reasons, a decision has been taken by the Committee of *Taradale U3A* to discontinue the annual *Napier Secondary Schools' Speech Competition* that was started in 2003 on the initiative of Eric Niania who also administered it for many years. The main reason for this decision is lack of support – not only from some of the local schools but also from most of our own members.

Over the past few years, only half of the eligible schools have actually competed and, for the past two years, we have had "no shows" on the day of the competition itself. In neither case did the school concerned present a back-up speaker, something that tends to wreak havoc with the organisation of such an event and is clearly unfair – not only to ourselves but also to the other contestants. At the same time, audience numbers have dropped dramatically – from over a hundred in the early years to around sixty more recently – and this out of a total membership of over four hundred – no longer warranting the amount of time, effort and financial commitment required in organising such an event, nor adequately recognising the contribution made by the students themselves, and those supporting them.

In an effort to encourage more participation and in response to demand over the years, both by the schools and from our own members, we have changed the date of the event, doubled the prize money and introduced a *People's Choice Award* (kindly sponsored by *Paper Plus* in Taradale) - but all to no avail. In a recent newsletter, we also asked for feedback from members as to their thoughts on the matter - but received none. Those who actually bothered coming along to listen to the speechmaking fully appreciated the benefits to the youngsters themselves, as did several of their teachers – notably those from *Taradale High School* and *William Colenso College*, the former having pipped the latter to the post in the Awards League. But, clearly, the writing is on the wall and the competition has outgrown its popularity.

Our grateful thanks are due to *Toastmasters* for having skilfully adjudicated the competition over the sixteen years of its existence and to Eric for having introduced it in the first place. We shall, however, endeavour to continue *Taradale U3A's* commitment to Youth and Age in other ways - **watch this space!**
